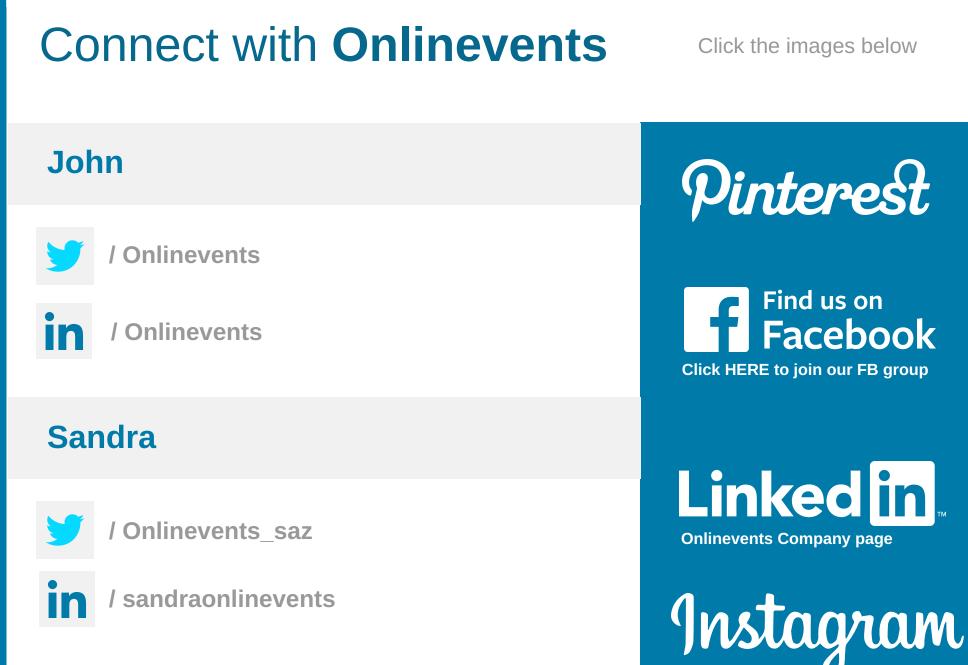
Event Details
